Welcome to the 169th edition of the McDonald's Corners Fair.



IN MEMORIAL

A Tribute

Beth Gemmill (Rochon)



Beth passed away suddenly on June 22, 2023. All of us who now work hard to maintain the historical Agricultural Hall as an important community resource owe Beth Gemmill (Rochon) much gratitude for her dedication and her vision. She was a pillar of the community of McDonalds Corners thanks to her work at The Agricultural Hall.

In the early 1990s the Ag Hall in McDonalds Corners was known throughout the area for its monthly musical Jamborees and the dinners that followed them. Beth, along with her musical family, helped organize these popular events and cooked the dinners that sealed their popularity. If you came to the Agricultural Hall on mid-afternoon of Jamboree Day you would find a packed dancehall full of dancers of all ages. After dancing all afternoon to local bands everyone sat down to a delicious roast beef dinner followed by a raft of homemade pies. All the local volunteers worked hard under her guidance. The kitchen was her domain. Then after cooking dinners for a hundred or so people Beth would unleash her sense of humour. Laughing with Beth on the back porch is a great memory.

She was also very accommodating to the people who wanted to put on concerts at the Agricultural Hall. No detail ever escaped her eagle eye. She organized contracts, arranged the necessary permits and the volunteers needed to make the events run smoothly. Negotiating with Beth was always up front and direct.

Beth is sorely missed for her knowledge and understanding of the changing face of the local community. She was able to communicate with both the old-timers and the newcomers. And she was always available. Her hard work and love for the Agricultural Hall was inspiring.

Scott Andrews April 12, 1955 – January 3, 2023

Scott passed away from cancer January 3rd, 2023. His will be missed for his willingness to help, his passion for having the hall filled with music, and his ever-present smile which greeted everyone.

Shirley Clement June 29, 1940 – July 20, 2023

Sadly, the community also bid farewell to Shirley, a long-time volunteer and valued community member. She will be greatly missed.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. An annual membership of seven dollars (\$7.00) shall constitute the subscriber a member of the society. This entry fee is to be paid for each person placing entries at the fair. No entry fee is required for Junior categories. <u>You may enter as</u> many items as you wish for one entry fee.

2.All articles for exhibition in the hall must be in place before 8:30 a.m. Saturday, September 30th. Exhibitors intending to bring hall exhibits in the morning must have entry tickets placed on the articles beforehand. There will be no tickets written in the morning. This rule will be strictly enforced.

3.All entries must be on the printed form found at the back of this book or a photocopy thereof. <u>Parties from a distance</u> can make a list of their entries and forward it to the Office by mail or email at <u>mdcas.office@gmail.com</u> if they will be picking up tickets on Saturday morning. All other entry forms to be turned in to the secretary when bringing in entries. This rule will be strictly enforced.

4.Each exhibitor will enclose the **\$7.00 entry fee** with the entry form. There is no entry fee for Junior exhibitors.

5. The treasurer will sum up the prizes and accounts before paying any prizes and shall then pay in proportion to the receipts of the Fair which may be 100% of the dollar. 100% will be paid, if possible, up to \$100.00 and over that the amount of the prizes will be paid at 80%. NO PRIZE MONEY CAN BE AWARDED UNLESS AN ENTRY FORM HAS BEEN FILED WITH THE SECRETARY. <u>NEW – ALL PRIZES ARE TO BE PICKED UP AT THE OFFICE ON THE DAY OF THE FAIR.</u>

6.Any exhibitor removing their goods or stock from hall or grounds before 4:00 p.m. on the day of the Fair will forfeit their prizes.

7. Any exhibitor wishing to sell an entry may do so at 4:00 p.m. on the day of the Fair.

8.No person shall be allowed to interfere with judges while they are discharging their duties. Exhibitors who interfere will forfeit their rights to any premiums to which they may otherwise be entitled. A director will accompany each class of judges and point out where goods and articles are located.

9. Judges shall have the power of withholding the premium when they consider the animal or article undeserving of one.

10.No mark, initial, or name will be made on any article or upon any bag, box or vessel containing an exhibit.

11.No exhibitor will be allowed to make more than one entry in any section.

12. All entries must be made or grown by the exhibitor. No purchased items allowed unless specifically mentioned in a category.

13.All articles to be exhibited must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor.

14.All articles not having entry tickets displayed will be passed over by the Judge.

15.All grains must be grown in 2023.

16.Junior exhibitors are welcome to place entries in the main hall categories.

The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.


